

## **Project Highlights**

This project highlights what students are learning about thinking deeply about characters. Students choose key takeaways from their readers notebooks to include in their showcase project that they work on in their Book Club group using Book Creator. Students produce a collaborative book that includes their writing reflections, images, and audio recordings.

Some key takeaways students write about include:

- Looking at the character's less likable sides
- Knowing that some traits matter more than others because they affect the rest of the story
- Reflecting on the characters and the story again after you read the ending







## **Staffing and Contracts**

- There are five new positions that OSS has requested that do not currently have a funding source. Only one of the five positions is for a 1:1 paraprofessional. The estimated cost to fund these positions for the remainder of the year is \$155,000.
- Unencumbered contracts as of today are estimated to be \$1,067,000. The FY25 IDEA grant was approved last week with \$450,000 for contracted services reducing the liability to \$617,000.
- Salaries no longer included in the IDEA grant need a funding source. This will increase the salary deficit in the operating budget by \$1,200,000.



## **Procedures for Purchasing**

- The procurement practices from bidding to ordering supplies and services that PSB follows today have been in place for many years and is well documented in the procedures manual developed by the Town procurement office and the Office of Administration and Finance in 2018.
- These practices are standard operating procedures in municipalities across the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and are designed to ensure fair, open, and rigorous practices in awarding contracts that involve the use of public money. They are also designed to adhere to government accounting standards, procurement laws, data privacy laws, and other legal requirements.
- The Town and School Department have offered training in procurement practices in August of 2023 and 2024 to ensure all staff are aware of the processes and procedures.



### **Actions**

The following actions have been taken over the last year to address the financial challenges (that emerged last year), and continue this year.

- Internal controls have been reinstated and ongoing support and training has been provided in the following areas
  - a) Position Control Numbers and Hiring Approval
  - b) Monthly reporting of new positions and funding source to Finance Committee
  - c) Grant application reviews by the Finance Committee
  - d) Contract Approval and Oversight
  - e) Purchase Order Management
- 2) Over-expenditure controls tightened in Munis
- 3) Budget workshops, online drop-in sessions, and one on one support provided to Budget Managers
- 4) Chart of Account consolidation



## **Next Steps:**

- Continue working with vendors to assist them through the contracting process
- Continue leveraging the cross-departmental working group, expanding as needed
- Commissioning a firm to conduct an audit
- Present Quarterly Report Review status of gap
