<u>DESE</u>	 FY26 FC0215 Genocide Education Grant Point Person: Greg Porter, Jen Martin, Gabe McCormick PSB applied for and received a Genocide Education grant for FY25, with a focus on professional development for 6-12 educators connected to genocide and effective strategies for working with students on the topic of genocide. PSB partnered with Facing History and Ourselves and held four PD sessions, working as a 6-12 team as well as in smaller 6-8 and 9-12 cohorts. In applying for the Genocide Education grant for FY26, the Social Studies department has several key aims connected to curriculum, professional development, and enrichment. In terms of curriculum, our plan is to build curriculum development teams for each grade level across 6-12, creating standards aligned lessons that meet both the needs of the respective grade levels as well as make sense in a vertical sequence. For professional development, we would continue our partnership with Facing History and Ourselves, with a shifted focus on supporting the curriculum development process in 6-12, including a specific focus on grade 10 and Holocaust education. Lastly, PSB would include a Holocaust survivor speaker as well as the Cattle Car exhibit that have been a part of previous school years.

Goal 1: Teaching & Learning

Increase achievement for students by establishing, implementing, and regularly assessing an equitable cohesive, culturally relevant, consistent standards-based curriculum in ELA, Math, Science, Social Studies and World Language delivered using evidence-based, culturally responsive instruction.

Develop and implement a culturally responsive community engagement plan that fosters connections among caregivers, schools, the district and the greater community.
